DICKINSON - Coach Larry Smith's Gator Junior Varsity cagers opened their 1966-67 basketball season with a rather easy win over Mt. Carmel. 44-30, here Friday night.

The Gators never trailed throughout the contest as they rolled up a 16-2 margin with 2:14 left in the first quarter.

Mt. Carmel poured in 6 straight points before the initial stanza was up, but Dickinson still led 16-8 at the end of it.

The Rebs outscored the Gators 10-7 in the second 8 minutes to play to cut the half-time margin to 23-18.

Bobby Thompson paced Dickinson in the first half of play with seven points, while Lewis Little and Dee Howard had four each.

Thompson ripped the next for six points in the third stanza and the Gators sprinted to a 34-24 lead at the beginning of the fourth quarter.

In that final period, Edward Shavers connected on a field goal and two free throws and gathered in three rebounds as the Gators blitzed the Rebs, 10-6, and made the final count 44-30.

Thompson led Dickinson ed by Little, Shavers, and James Wedgeworth who had six each.

Dickinson got a good rebounding effort from five boys. Wedgeworth had 8, Little and Howard grabbed off seven each, while Shavers and Marcus Martinez took in five rebounds each.

The Gators had a hot night from the floor, hitting 14 of 25 shots for a 56.0 percentage.

Only four out of 28 times last year did the Gators have reason for any after game on the bus happiness, but last Friday evening the Dickinson bus pulled away from the sight

of victory to the strains of numerous "soul" verses. chants, and songs.

The Gators had every right to be happy as they combined a sharp shooting offense and a rugged 1-3-1 zone defense to rack the Rebs.

From the second quarter on, however, it was all Dickinson. Early in that quarter, the Gator fast break help narrow the margin to one point, 13-12, with Mike McMurrey slipping in a pair of crip shots with 5:24 and 5:03 left in the first half.

In the next four minutes, the Rebs tallied 10 points and David Neal countered with three field goals for the Ga-
