








"Downtown" Bacliff caught under gathering rainclouds.

At school we sense our community the strongest of all, for through its fine schools it reveals most clearly its spirit of goodness and democracy.


To Dickinson, to Bacliff, and to San Leon, we students wish to say thanks for your beauty and modern progress.

An early morning filigree of light on the Methodist Church.










Distant wooded Bayou shores over twisted growth of swamp cane.


Our Post Office and Bank mark the approximate geographic center of Dickinson.












Trees and shadows add contrast to Episcopal Church, white in the morning sun.





T-38 slows for the bridge and then streaks for the mouth of the Bayou.

Distant houses on shore look lonely across the water at San Leon.










Follow this straight ribbon of highway up past the watertower and you'll soon be in Houston.


Off in the distance are the trees along the Bayou and beyond that, not too far, is the Gulf of Mexico.
