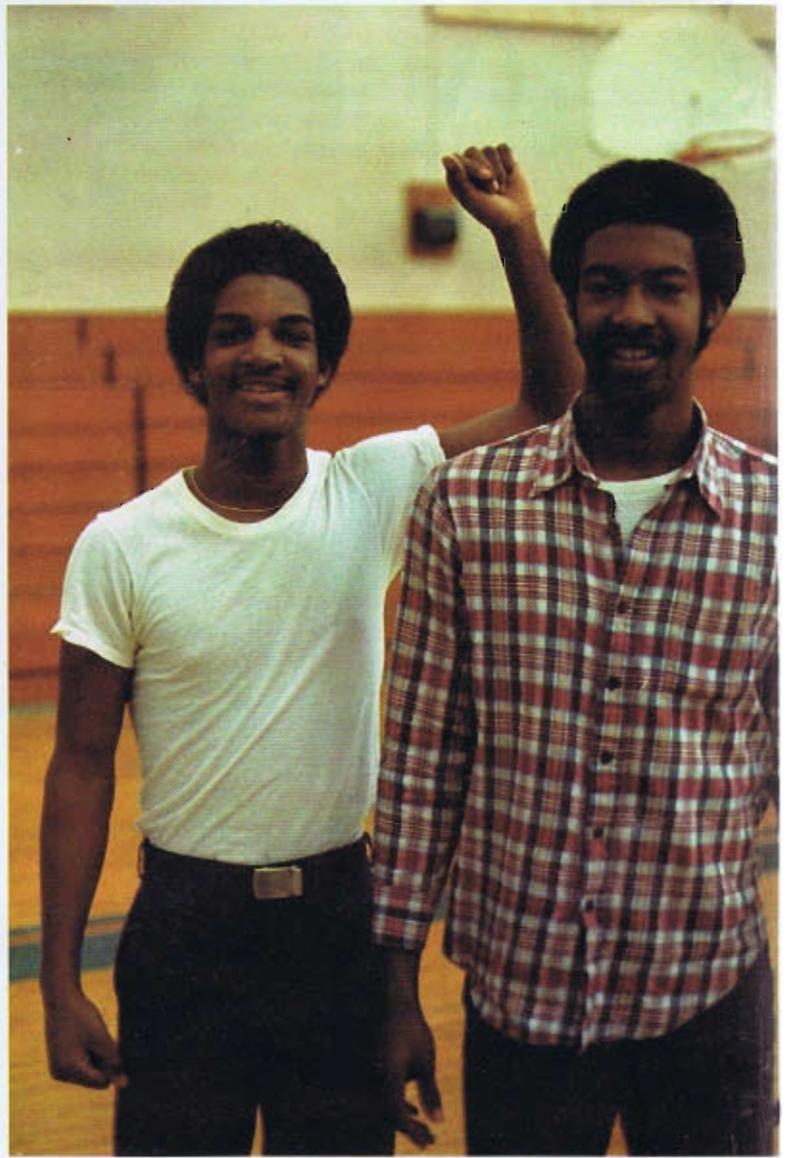

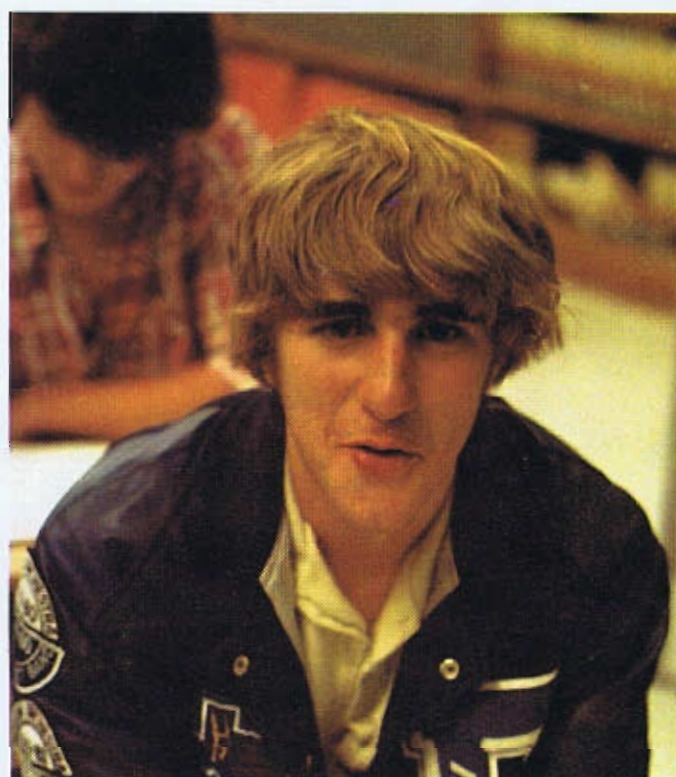

Through the many honorable organizations such as the Band, Student Council, National Honor Society and many others, Dickinson High School has a reputation to be proud of.

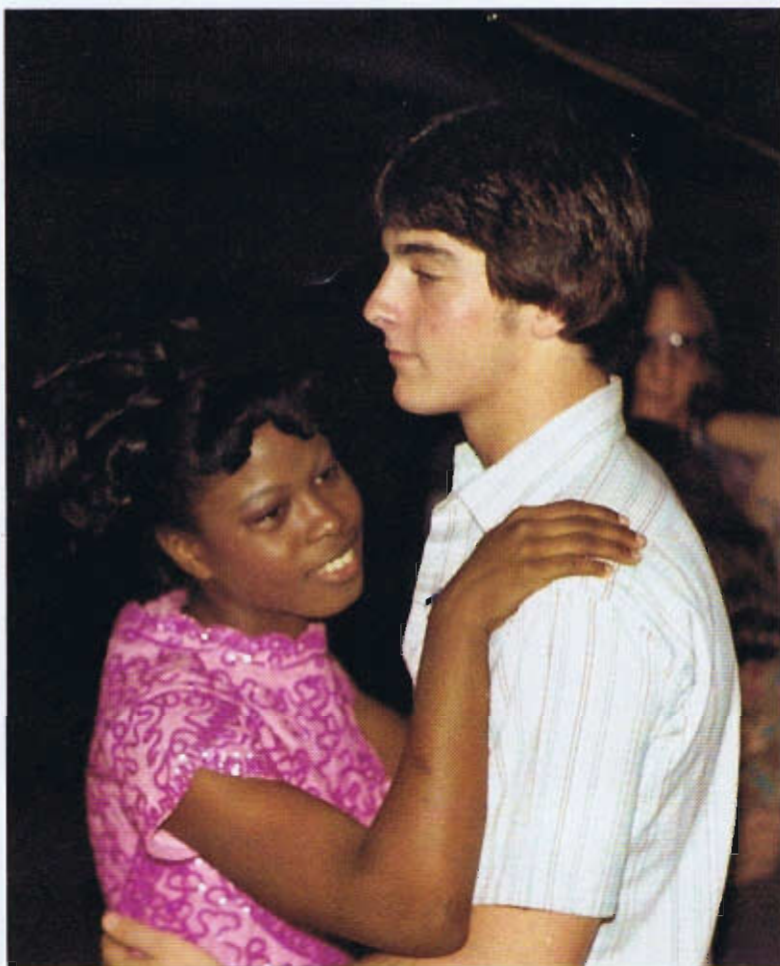
A sense of security kept our pride up. Despite the financial crunch, the students had faith in a school system that has given them many years of education.

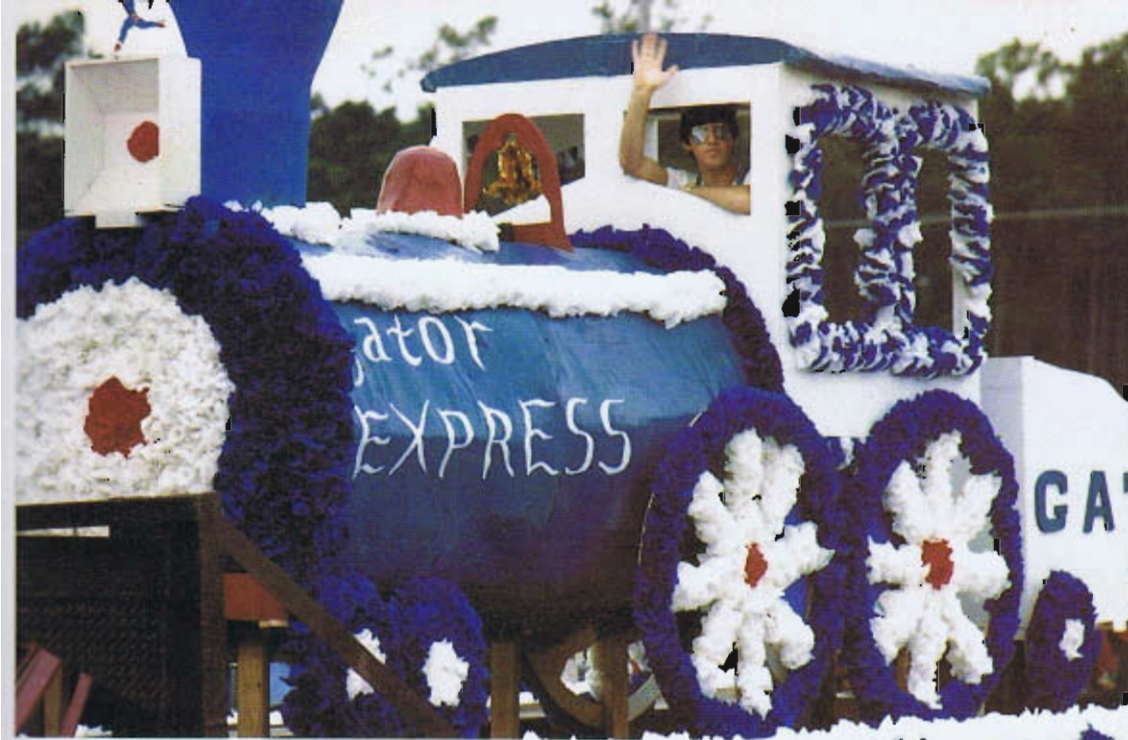

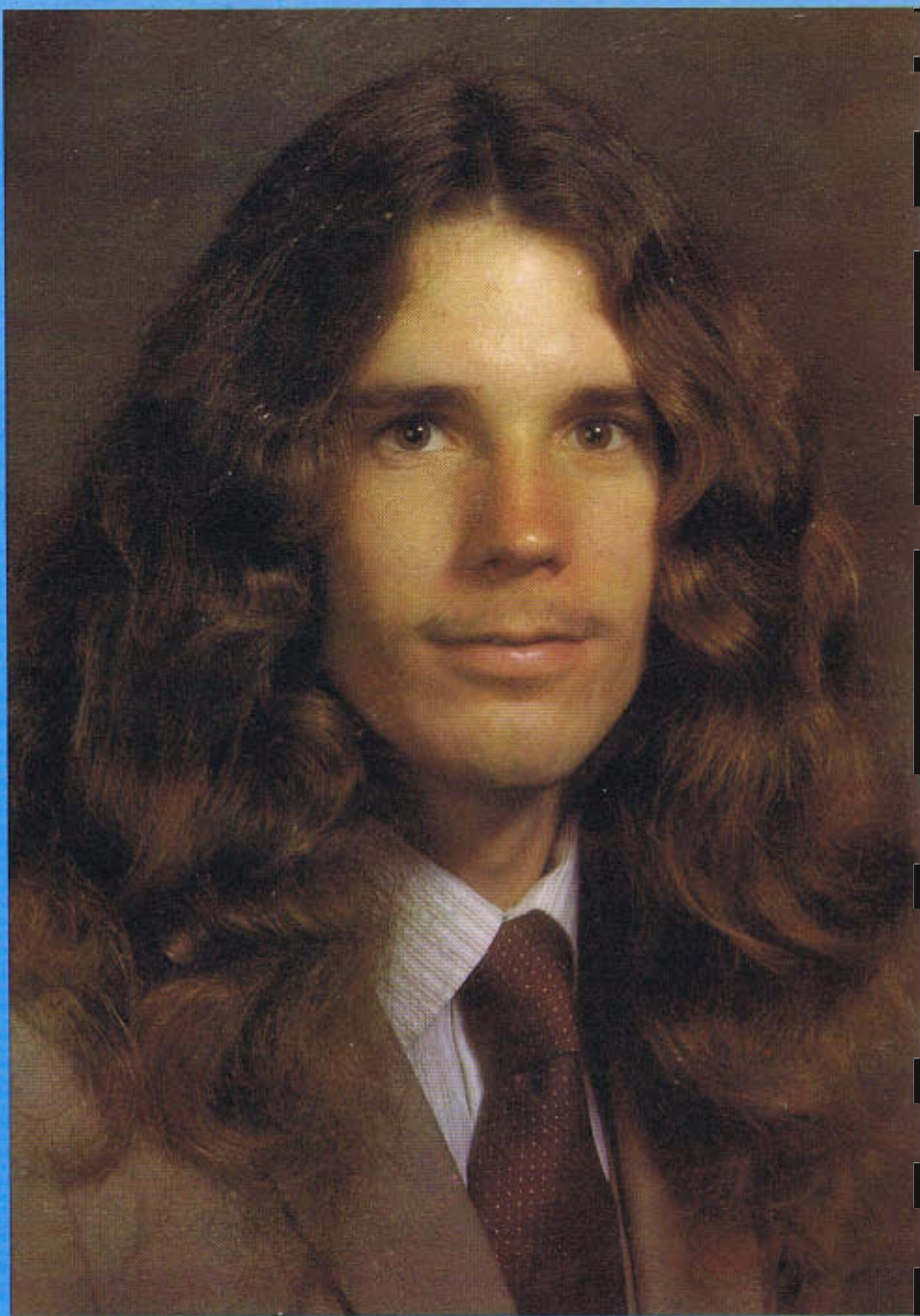

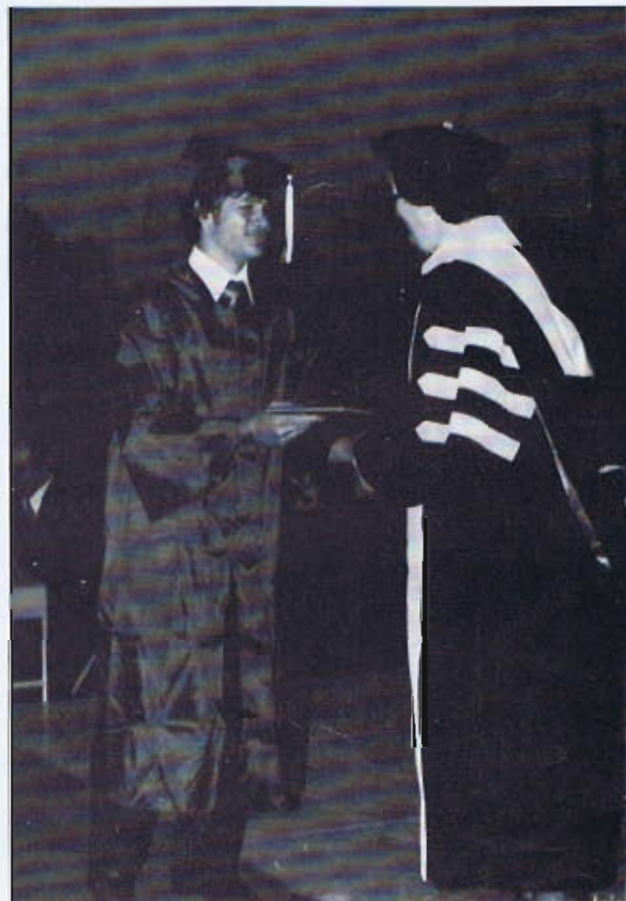

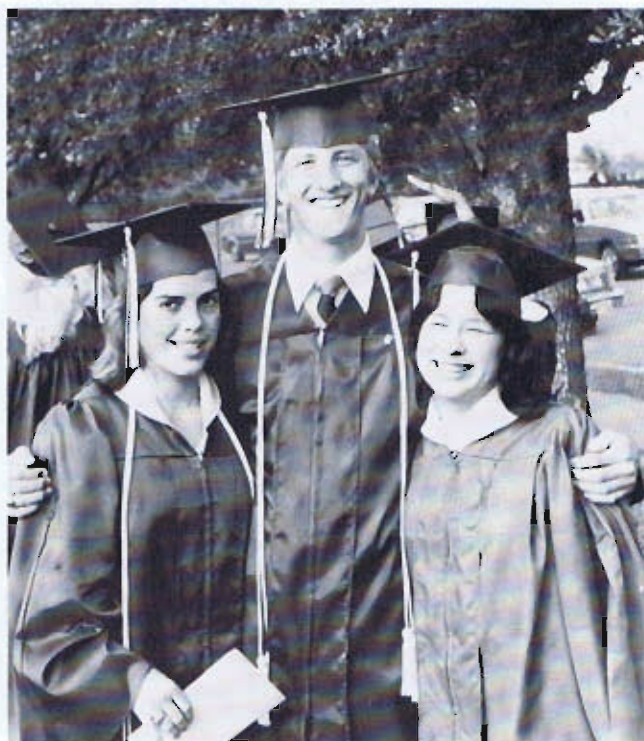
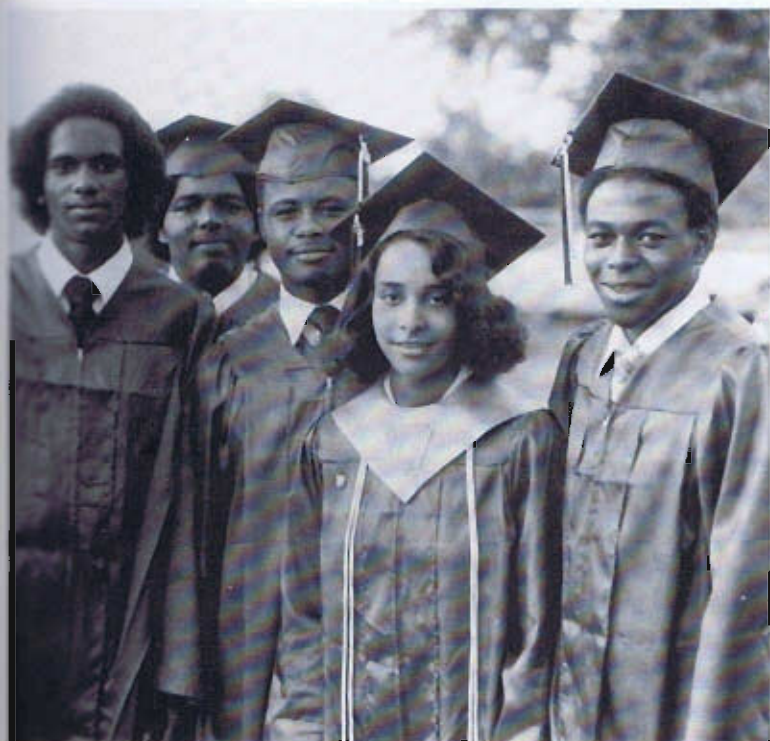

A Night to Remember

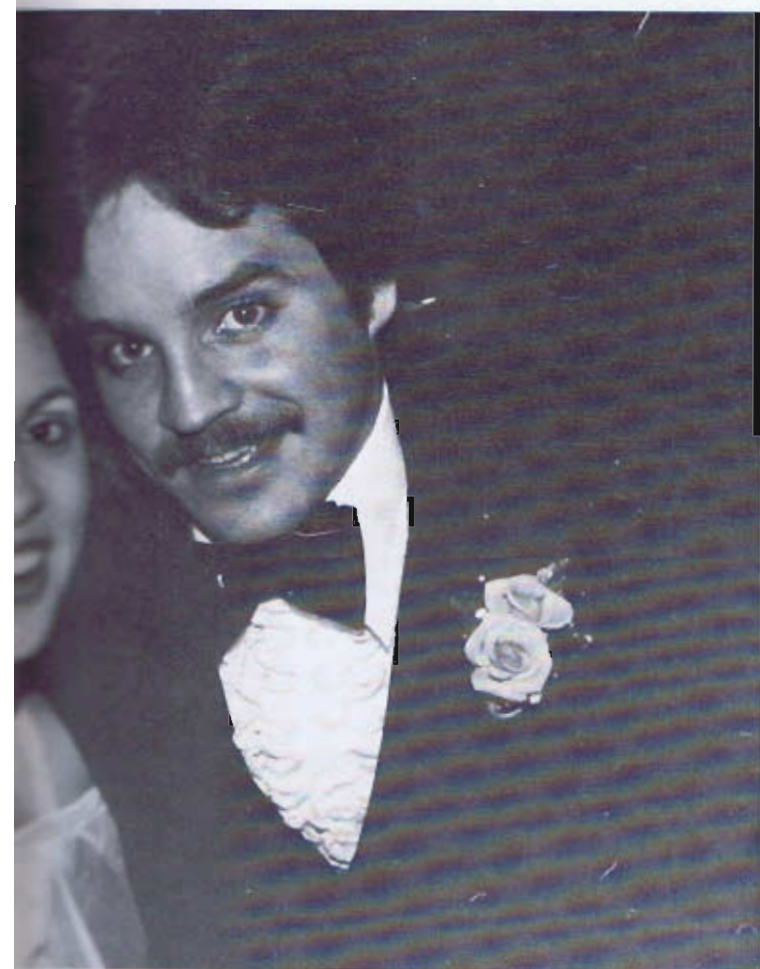

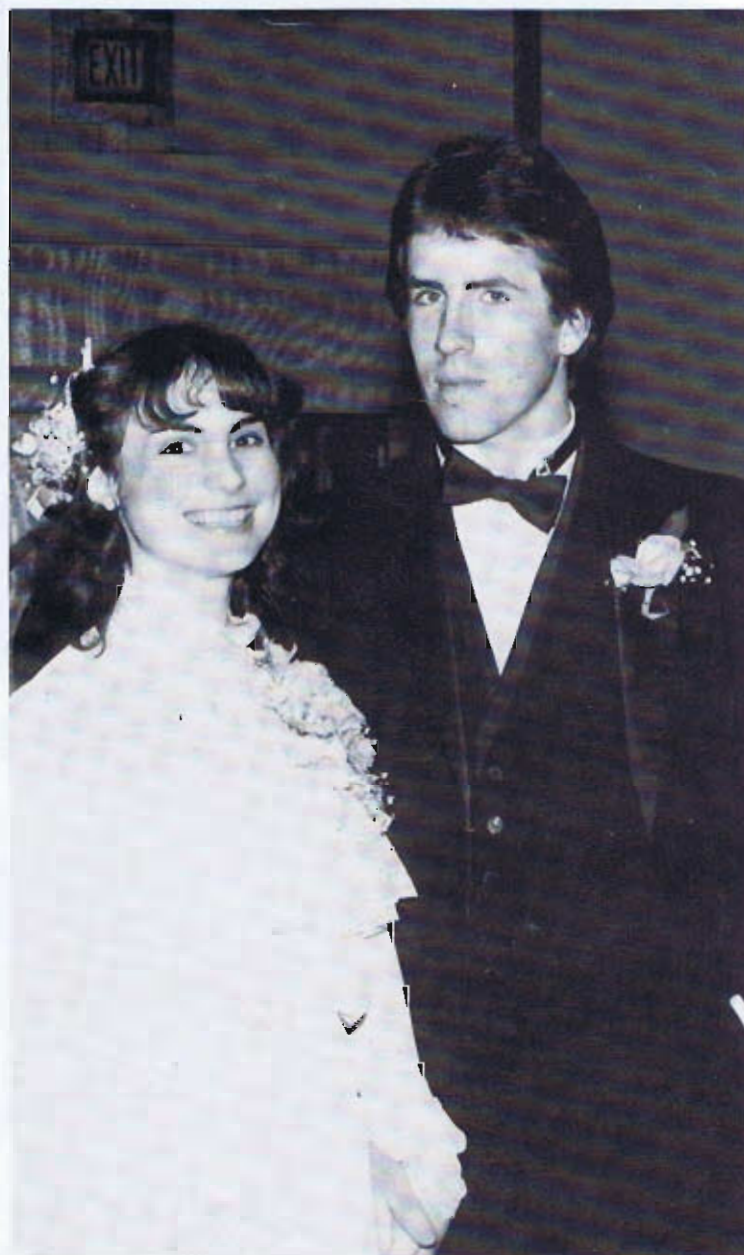

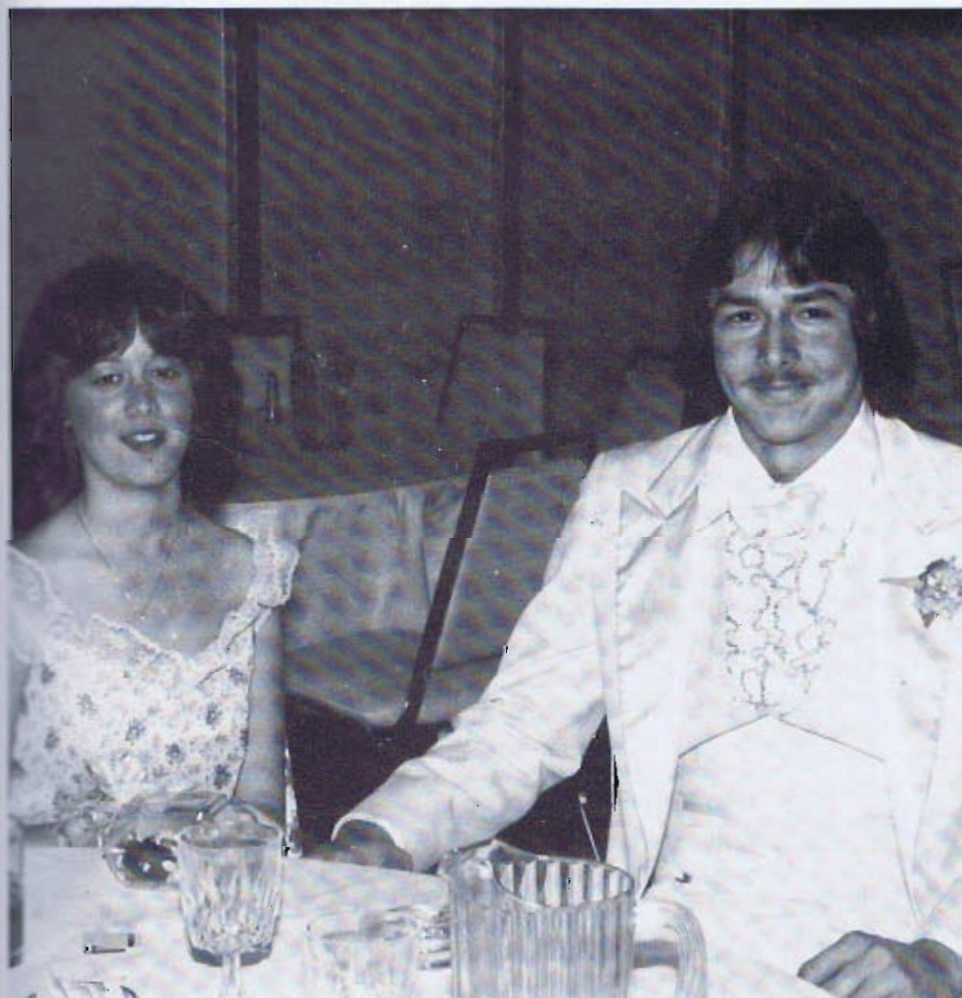

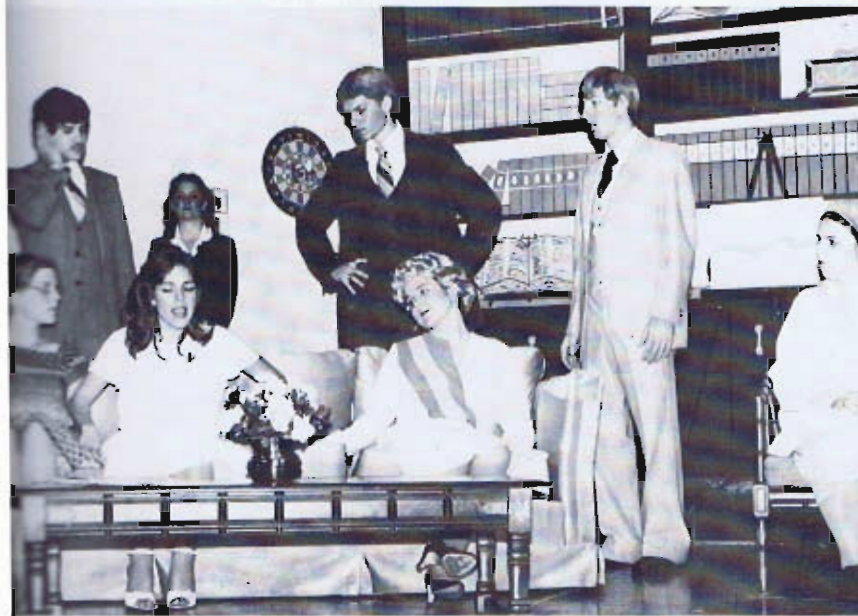

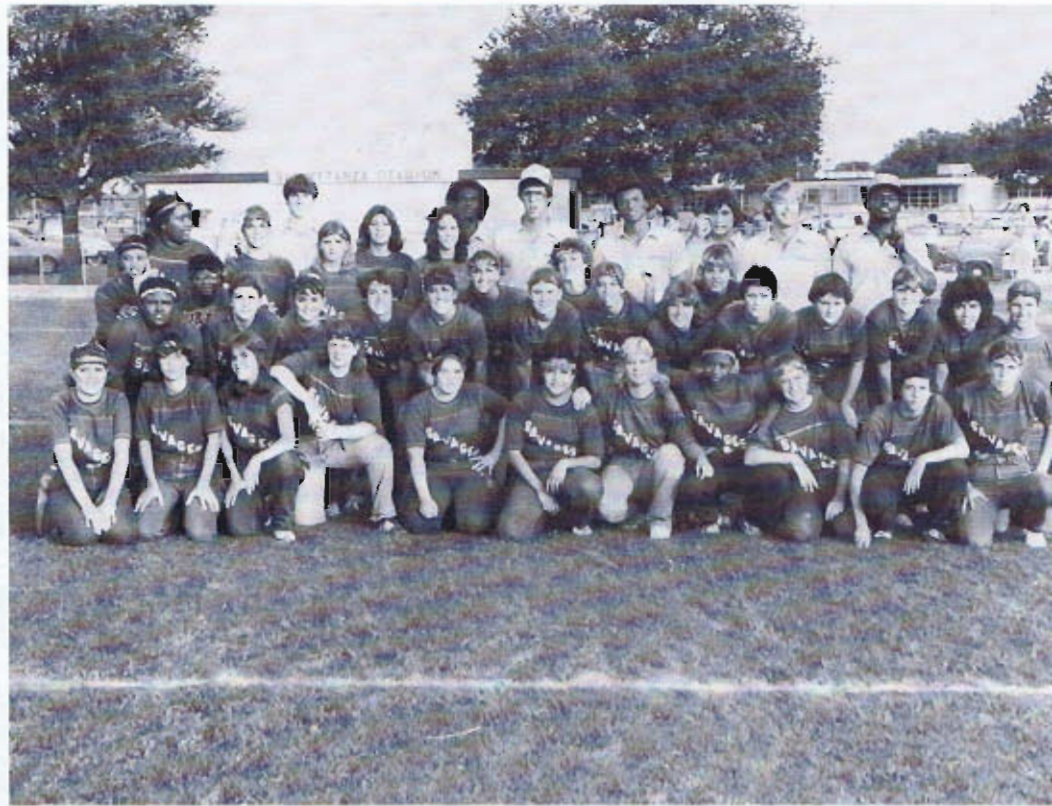

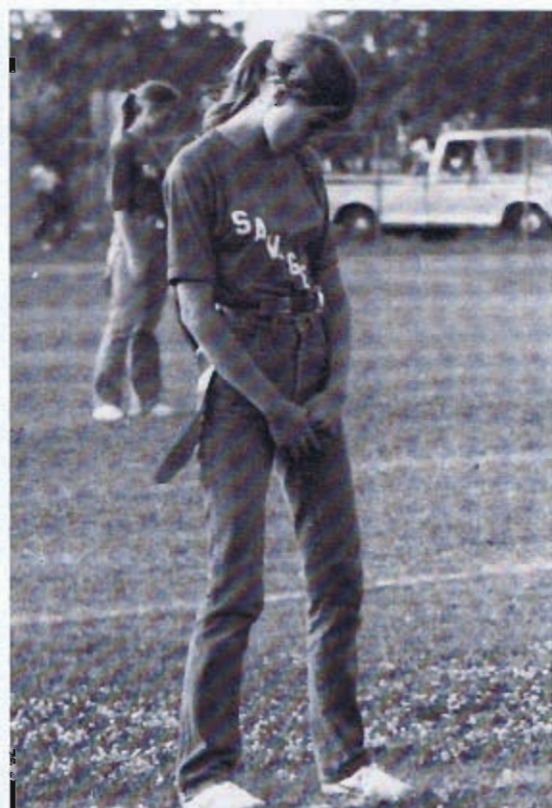

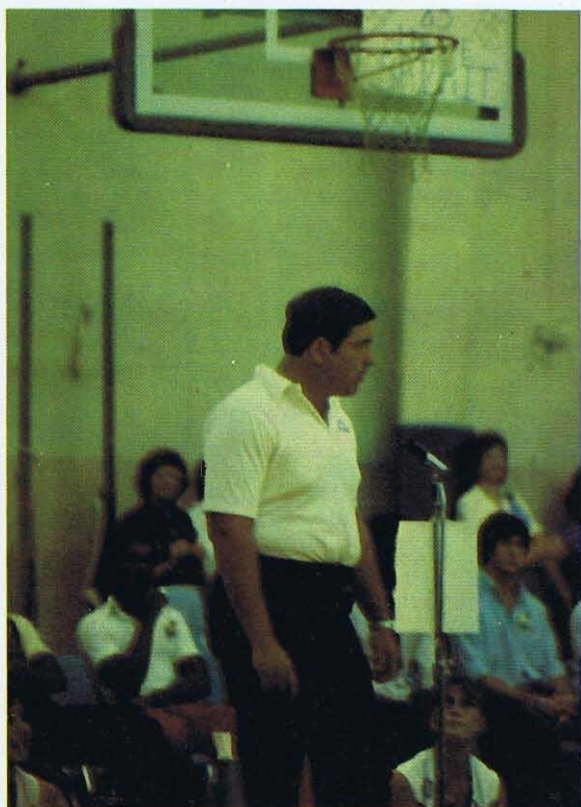

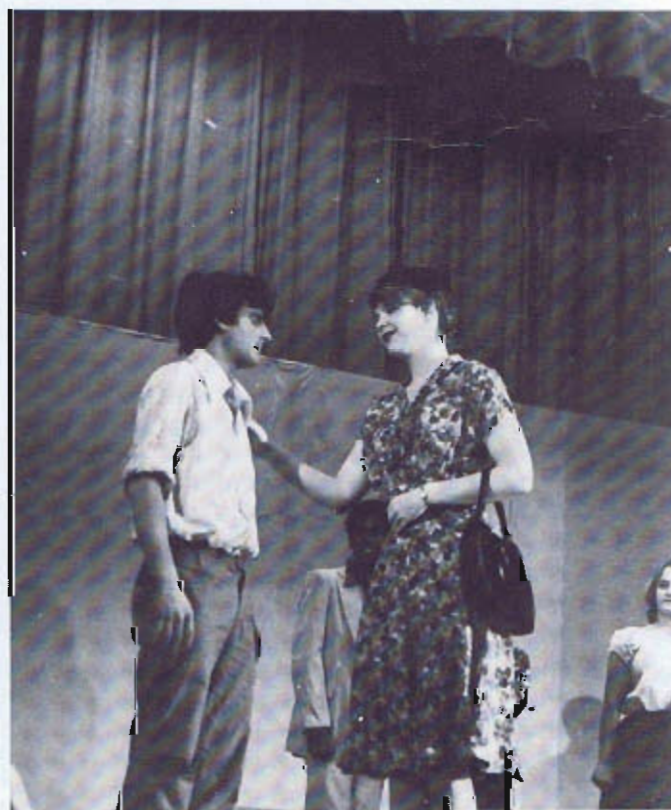

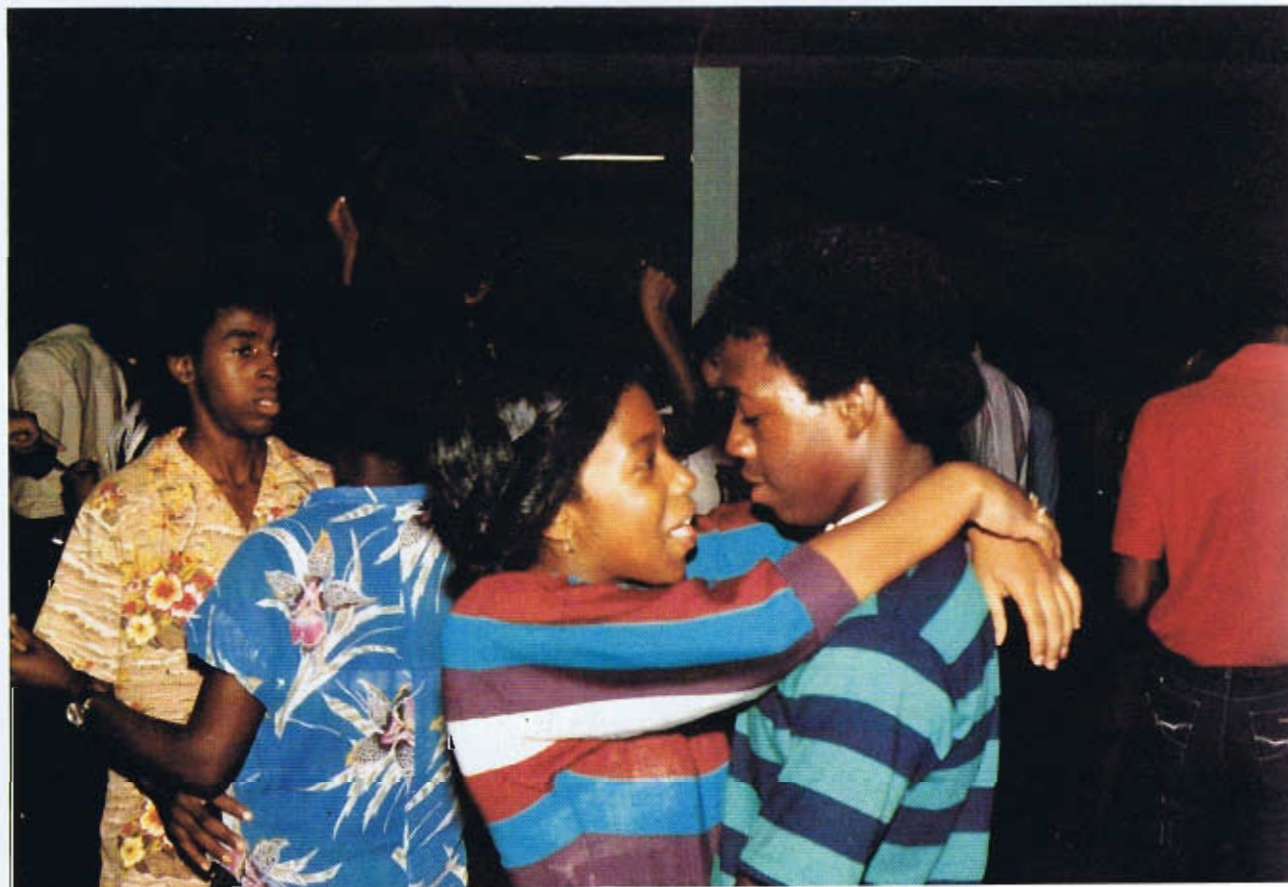

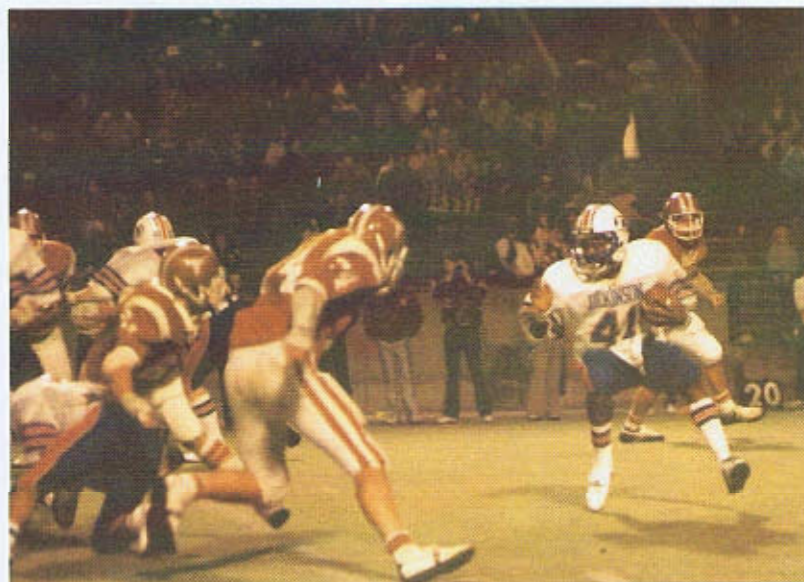

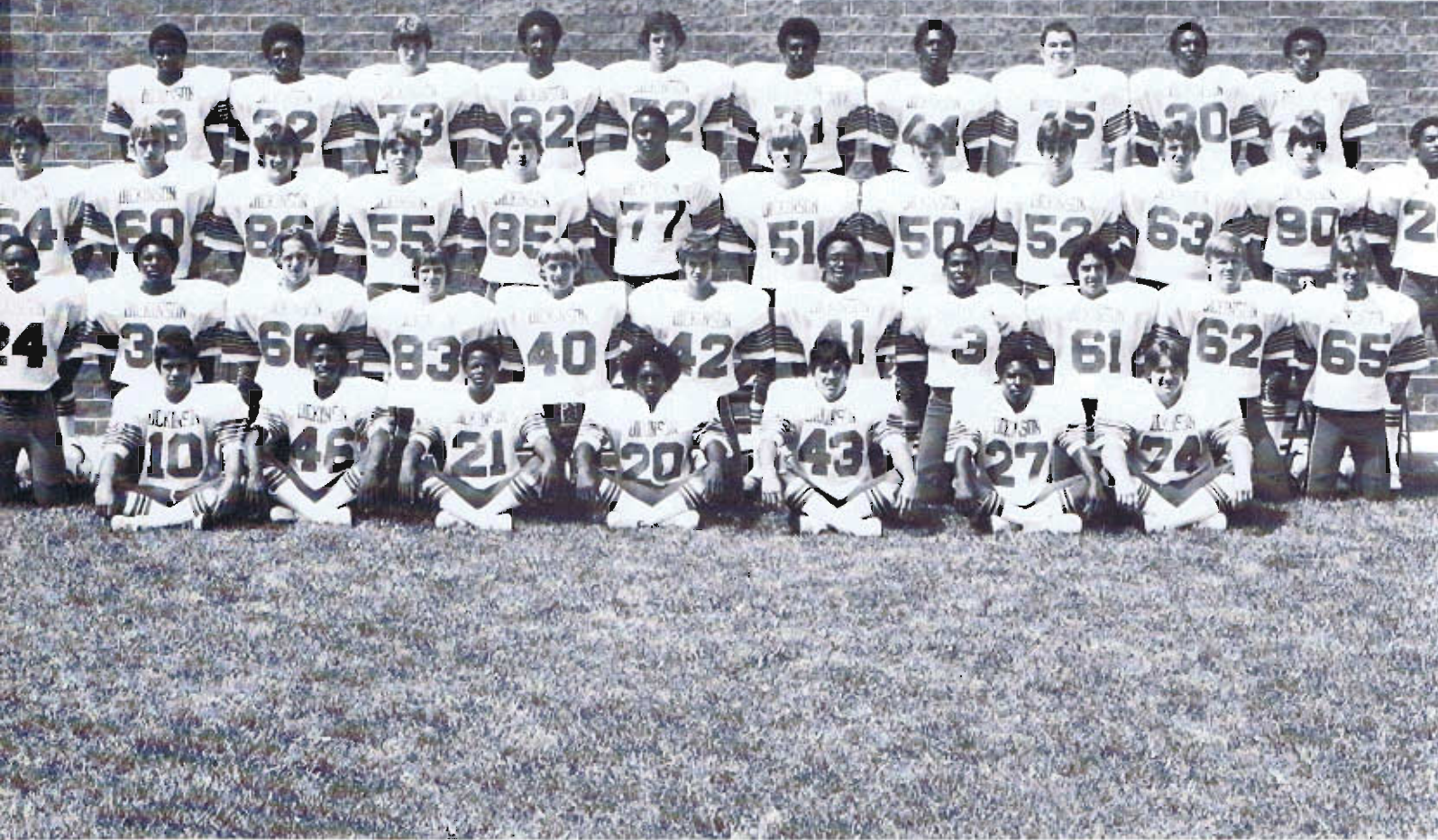

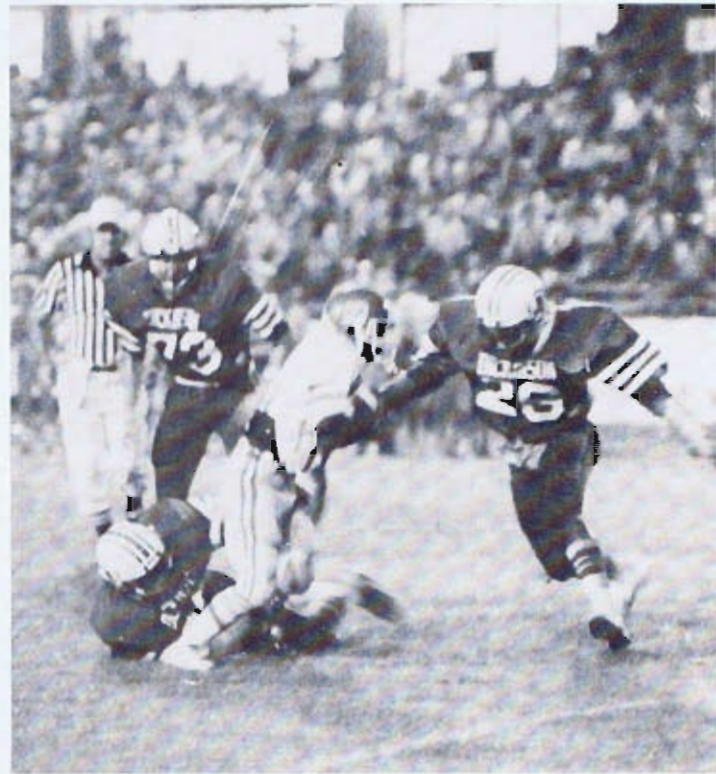

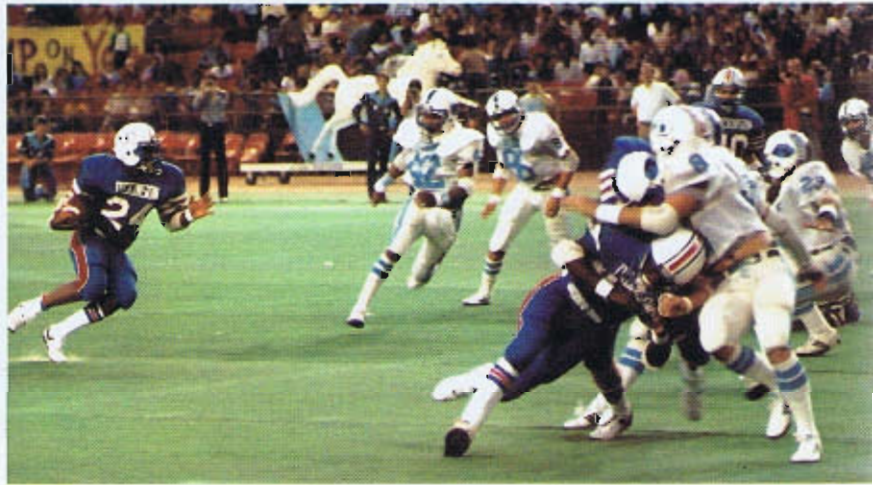

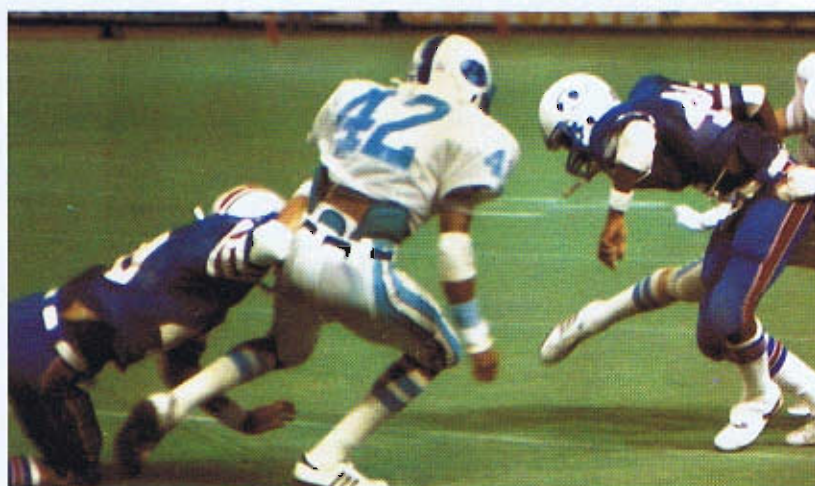

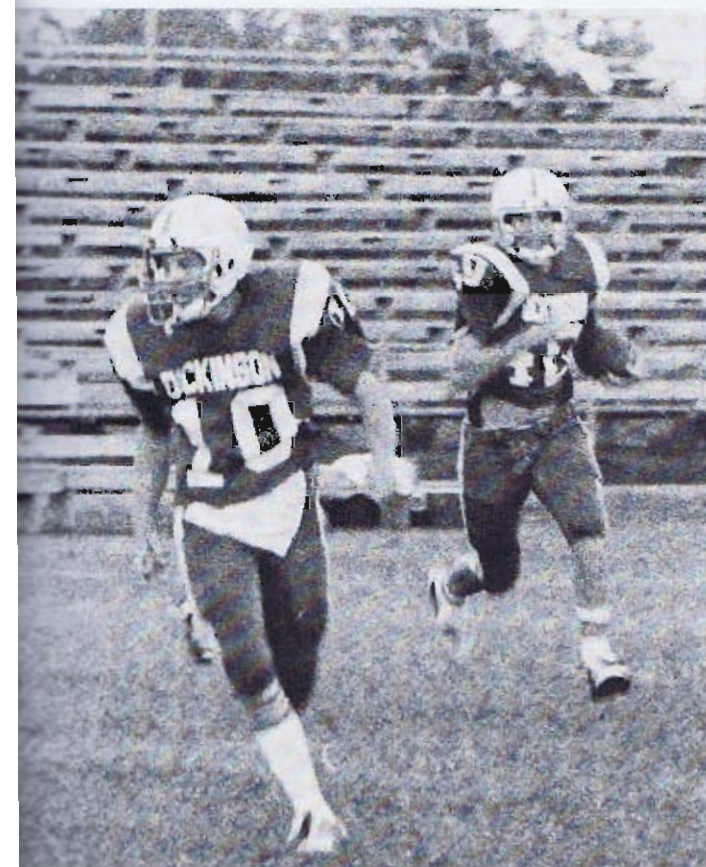
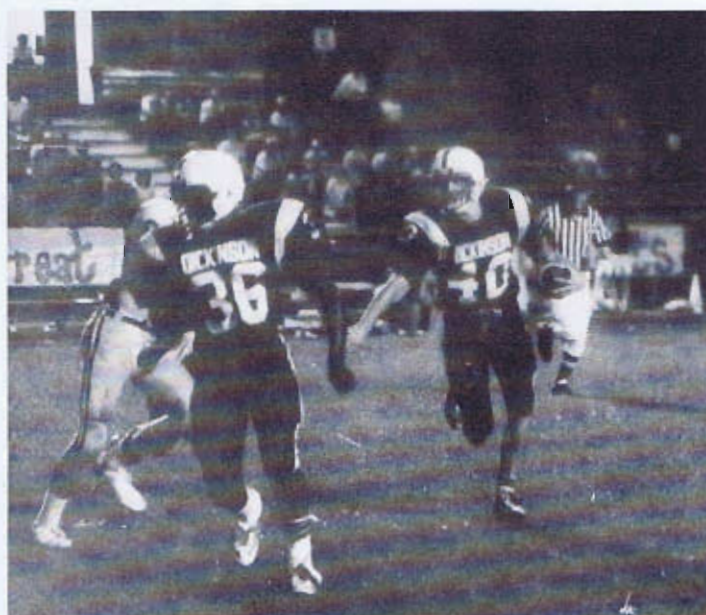
