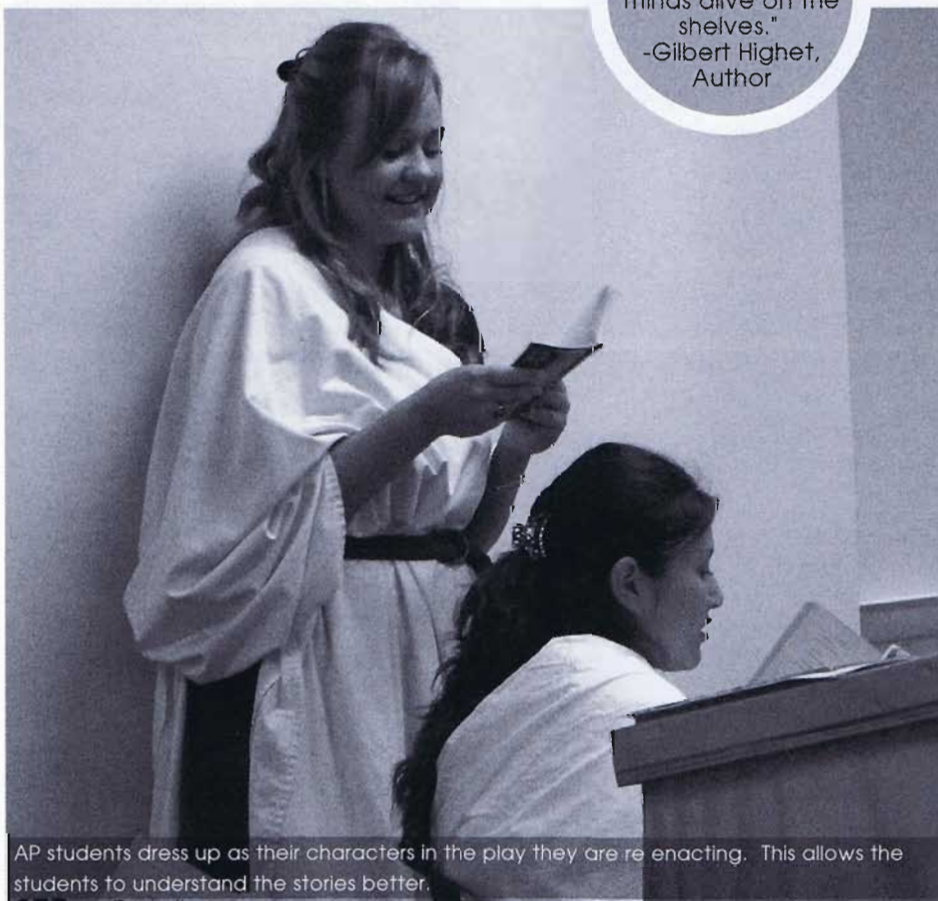
ENGLISH

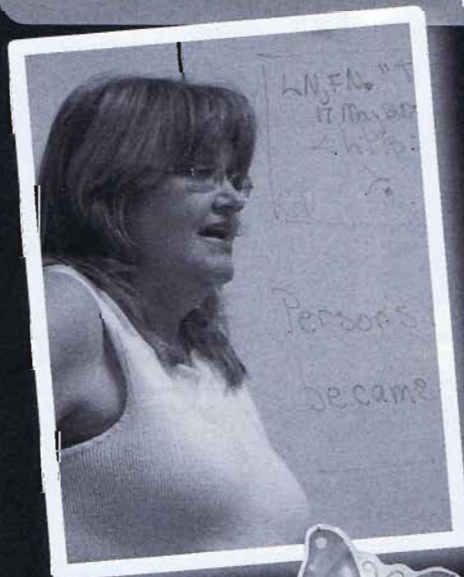

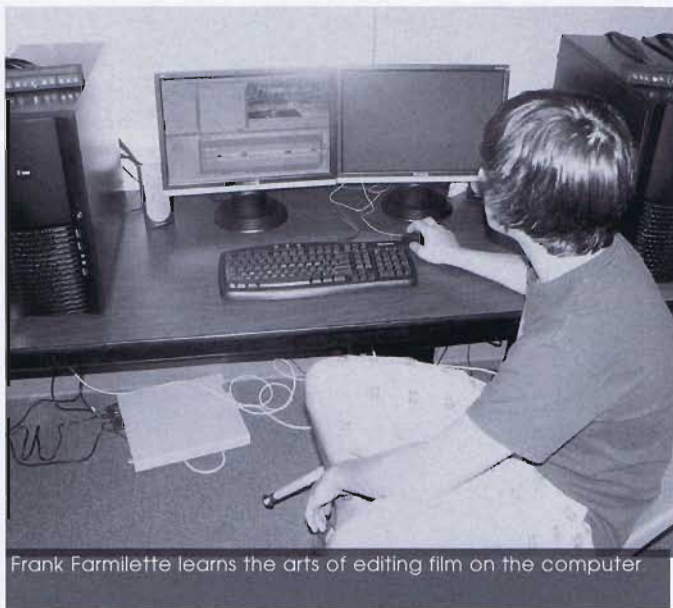

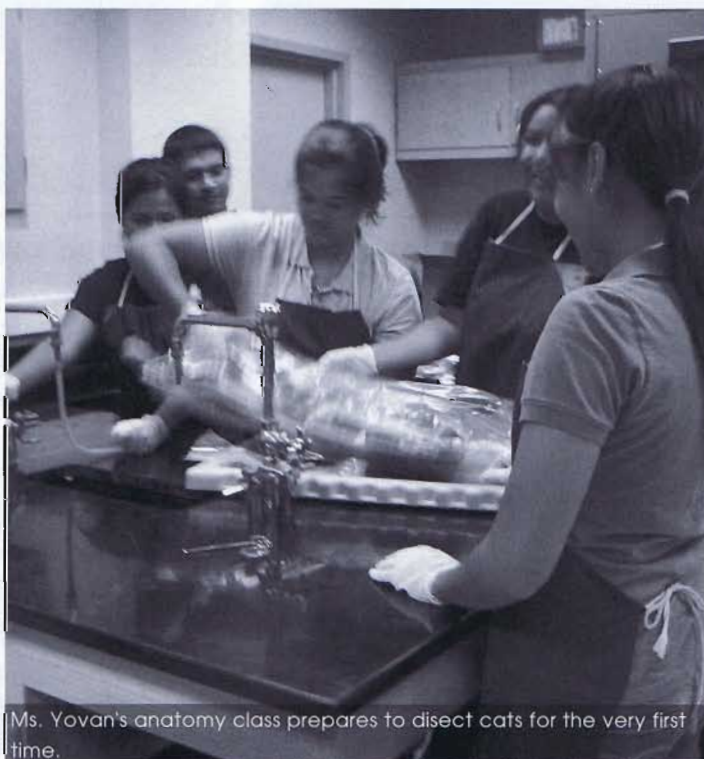

A I would consider myself pretty easy-going, but I have expectations and standards.

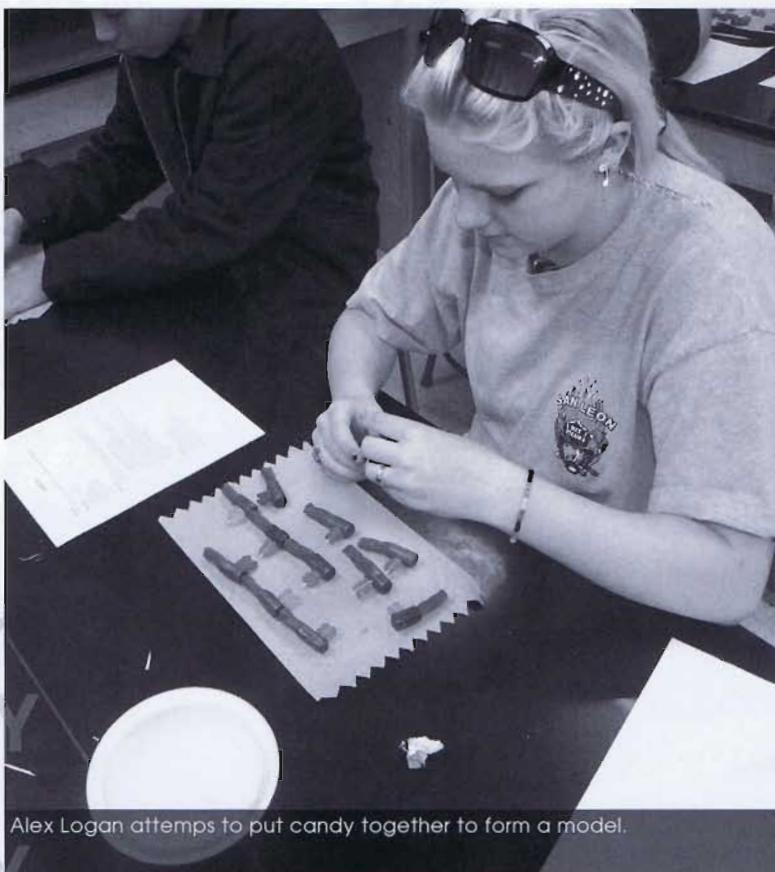

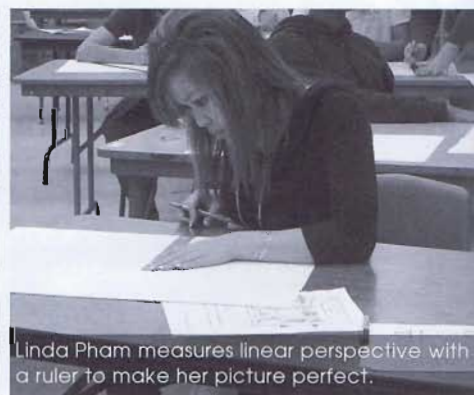

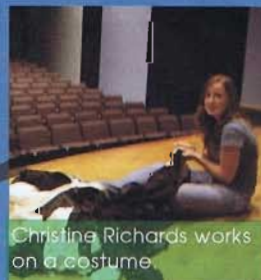
